Did you get the Memo? ... The Red Bandana[™] Help for our Fearful or Reactive Dogs

Last week the Steamboat Pilot published a news article about Fearful and Reactive Dogs, written by me, as part of our continuing education series called A Dog's Eye View.

We are launching a new campaign to use the Red Bandana[™] rule for reactive and fearful dogs in public places. When you see a dog wearing this Red Bandana[™] it means that this dog should not be approached or petted. Please help owners who have fearful or reactive dogs by giving them a little space. We now have these red bandanas available and

Here's what to do:

Instructions:

It is our job to protect our fearful dog from well meaning people. With your help we can educate children and adults about fearful or reactive dogs.

When someone approaches you and your dog please ask them to "STOP." Point out this red bandana and tell them this Red Bandana[™] means your dog should not be approached. Ask them to spread the word. Dogs wearing this Red Bandana[™] are either afraid or they are not friendly to all people and other dogs. Ask them to please give you and your dog a little extra space.

Teach your dog to sit/stay and focus on you. If you see a person and dog coming down the trail, you can move off the trail several yards and ask your dog to sit/stay. You and your dog should move far enough away so that he does not become reactive. Reward your dog for maintaining the sit/stay while others walk by. Let them go past and point out the Red Bandana[™] and let them know you and your dog are training. For fearful or reactive dogs, the use of positive reinforcement training should always be a first choice.

Dogs off leash can be a real problem.

If a person is walking their dog off leash, call out to them that you have a "Red Bandana dog" and they should not allow their dog to meet your dog. You move off the trail and work on the sit/stay while they walk by. Remember to maintain enough distance so that your dog does not react. Help more and more people to become aware that fearful or reactive dogs need additional space.



Children should be taught to NEVER approach a dog without permission. Even the cutest dog can be afraid of strangers. The Red Bandana[™] will become a visual signal to children to not approach that dog.
